New Training Materials for Foundation Trainees

Lancaster University and Health Education England are delighted to introduce *Building reflective spaces for Foundation Doctors:*Thinking ethically, legally, and professionally. A series of training materials specially created to meet the ethical, legal and professionalism training needs of Foundation Doctors.

The ambition underpinning the training series is to promote and encourage ethically sensitive, ethically aware, and ethically reflective Foundation Doctors.

The purpose of the training materials is to address a currently unmet need identified by Foundation Doctors. The topics of the training materials have been identified by Foundation Doctors as those they would most wish to receive training on during their foundation training (see Machin et al., 2019). There are currently four training

packs available to be piloted:

- self-discharge against medical advice
- chemically restraining patients
- engaging with suicidal patients
- DNACPR

The focus of each training pack is on the ethical, legal, and professional aspects of the topic, rather than on clinical practice and/or medical knowledge. A fifth training pack is under way on the topic of organ donation.

The aim is for each training session to provide a reflective space for Foundation Doctors to consider the ethical, legal, and professional aspects of their everyday clinical encounters. The training packs build upon the ethical, legal and professionalism learning the Foundation Doctors will have gained from medical school, and therefore advance their knowledge, understanding

and learning in these areas.

The training packs have been led by Dr Laura Machin, a non-clinical senior lecturer in medical ethics at Lancaster Medical School, and overseen by Professor Paul Baker, Deputy Postgraduate Dean for the North West of England Foundation Schools. With each training pack, Laura and Paul have collaborated with a wide range of clinical colleagues from a variety of clinical specialties across England.

The training packs have been designed to be delivered by clinical colleagues who may or may not have little experience or formal qualifications in ethics, law, or professionalism. Alternatively, non-clinical colleagues, such as academics at local medical schools, have also been considered when designing the content of the training materials and therefore can also be considered as possible facilitators for the training.

The content of the training packs has been mapped against the new UK Foundation Programme Curriculum (2021) and the eportfolio, Horus, thereby illustrating the need for the training to the Foundation Doctors. The content is drawn from published research such as qualitative studies, as well as a range of medias including blogs, podcasts, and television. Each pack includes a slide pack and a facilitator's guide on how to build the training session. The training materials can be used for F1 or F2 and can be adapted to the mode of delivery e.g., in person, or remote, as well as providing sufficient material for a session between 50 minutes (lecture style with little group interaction) and up to 2 hours in length (workshop style with high group interaction).

The training packs provide discrete training opportunities for Foundation Doctors, and therefore it is not necessary for all four training packs to be used, or to be used in a particular order. That said, the ethical concepts, principles, frameworks, and theories in each pack are purposively different so that the ethical learning of Foundation Doctors is developing and expanding with each training pack used.

The training materials are currently being piloted with the support of 10 hospital trusts across England. So far, they have been used at regional training days, so that one pack has been used in the morning and a different pack in the afternoon in order to provide an 'ethics and law' training day. They have also been used within departments, rather than solely Foundation Doctors, as it was deemed a topic that all members and grades of a team would benefit from. Finally, they have been delivered within specific hospitals, in person, to a smaller number of Foundation Doctors compared to those larger numbers at regional training days.

Once the pilot of the training materials has concluded, it is anticipated that the packs will be available online and accessible to all via the HEE NW website. Environmental Sustainability in Healthcare



The NHS is a huge contributor to our carbon footprint in the UK, being responsible for around 20 million tonnes of CO₂ emissions annually. The NHS carbon footprint is multifactorial, including clinical care, clinical behaviours, NHS buildings and real estate, technology, travel (staff and patients), pharmaceutical production and disposal as well as disposal of clinical and non-clinical waste.

To achieve 'net zero' and sustainability in healthcare, there needs to be engagement and action across all of health and social care. There are certainly areas we can improve on via LSFD, to educate the current and future clinical workforce about sustainability and the net zero initiative. Clinical leadership and education are required to achieve change in such areas.

Current Activity:

Sustainability now features in the Foundation and College curriculae; encouraging trainees to consider aspects of this in their training and QI (Quality Improvement) activity.

The Centre for Sustainable Healthcare (www.sustainablehealthcare.org.uk) has many resources that can be used (as well as many educational events) to support trainees interested in developing a project around sustainability.

There are working groups and WhatsApp groups across HEE NW sharing ideas and good practice.

There are sustainability fellowships and initiatives in some Schools (notably the School of Anaesthesia), and pockets of high-quality activity typically focussed on QI project work in this area.

Future Activity:

Having facilitated access to resources for many trainees and trainers, we are hoping to be able to secure funding to increase this in the future.

- Aspiration to include sustainability on teaching programmes.
- Commitment to appoint a Sustainability QI Fellow in 2022.
- Development of a webpage for LSFD, on a sustainability theme.

NHS Values Training for Newly Qualified Colleagues

The values training for the North West of England School of Foundation Training and Physician Associates has just been published in the Royal College of Physicians journal, the paper can be accessed via this link: https://www.rcpjournals.org/content/futurehosp/8/2/e277

The training covers a common set of core values and standards that should be shared throughout the NHS, originally developed in the wake of the Francis Report. The NHS Constitution is viewed as the first reference point but training and education for healthcare professionals was highlighted in the report, as being a strategy for promoting the desired culture shift. The Constitution sets out what patients, the public and staff can expect from the NHS, and conversely, what the NHS expects from them in return. Organisational values remain as a fundamental requirement for putting the patient at the heart of everything the NHS delivers.

The session lasts around 2 hours and involves a slide presentation covering the structure of the NHS, the background to the values and the Francis Report, some generic information on the importance of values within other large, complex organisations (the NHS is currently the eighth largest employer on the planet, having dropped from fifth in recent years and now behind three major Chinese energy companies), small group work and whole group feedback sessions based around real case studies. Trainees are then encouraged to reflect on the experience using a bespoke form on the Horus online system; this allows them to map specific softer core competencies to their personal development plan, providing evidence for their foundation portfolio.

The training is also entirely suitable for a multidisciplinary audience, more information is available from Paul.Baker@hee.nhs.uk

PGMDE Conference 2021 - Report

The 2021 PGMDE Conference went ahead in virtual format again on 30 September 2021, under the theme 'Supporting Learners and Learning: An Inclusive Approach'. The conference was very well attended, and we had three excellent speakers who covered a wide range of topics.

Our own Dr Rebecca Baron opened with a talk on how we learn and the neurobiology of frazzle, with a well-cited explanation of how our brains fare on low energy along with some excellent resources for further reading. This was followed by Dr Roy Wallworth's workshop on Conscious Competence, starting with a brilliantly straightforward explanation of the topic followed by group work to give delegates a chance to reflect and discuss the concept and how it related to their working lives as well as their trainees.

Our keynote speaker was Dr Nazir Lone, Senior Clinical Lecturer in Critical Care, University of Edinburgh and Honorary Consultant in Critical Care, Royal Infirmary of Edinburgh. Dr Lone gave his Effective Ally talk, which he was doing on a virtual basis for the first time. This was especially important to the audience of the conference, who not only may have a different lived experience to a lot of their trainees, and are in a position to make a real difference to people

who might not feel like they can speak up and need someone in a position of authority to help and advocate for them.
